

Zoom underwater on a motorised scooter, keep your hair dry on a helmet dive or soar above the Great Barrier Reef on a parasailing adventure.
The enormity of the reef is matched by its diversity of experiences with sail boats, fast catamarans, helicopters and seaplanes ready to take you there.

4. CHECK OUT THE ACTION AT THE MARINA

Wander Sailfish Quay admiring super yachts and checking out the game fishing fleet in the Cairns Marlin Marina before enjoying a cocktail on the waterfront. Watch the Great Barrier Reef boats return around 5pm as the sun slowly sinks over the mountains ending another beautiful day in the tropics.
